## Health Precautions

Provisional health precautions during COVID.

\*\*100.0 temp is different than stated in our parent handbook. 100.0 temp will be followed until further notice.

As we begin the school year, Good Shepherd is continuing our commitment to provide a healthy and safe preschool environment. Here are the Health Precautions implemented.

### 1. Arrival:

- a. **Parents will not enter the classroom.** A teacher will greet you and your child at the door to transition your child in and out of the classroom.
- b. Child's temperature will be taken with a no-touch temporal artery thermometer. Children with a temperature over 100.0 will not be able to attend preschool until fever-free and symptom-free for 24 hours or more. \*\*

Thermometers are cleaned with alcohol after each use.
- c. **Face coverings are required for all adults.**
- d. **Bring your own open to sign your child in.**
- e. Adults maintain **6-foot physical distance from each other.**
  - i. When greeting parents at the door, teachers will attempt to respect 6-foot physical distancing. This may be difficult for younger children experiencing separation stress, teachers will assess and adjust for the child's needs.
- f. Teachers will assist children with handwashing when they enter the classroom. Handwashing is done many times throughout the day.
- g. **Hand Sanitizing Station** is available on the sign-in/out table for parents to use and supervise their children's use of sanitizer.
- h. **Parents may not linger on campus after pick-up or drop off.** Please leave promptly.

### 2. Physical Distancing

- a. Children are remaining in groups as small as possible. The same teachers are interacting with the same children.
- b. During snack and meals, more tables are being used to provide distancing between children.
- c. Teachers wear gloves when serving children snack individually rather than snacks being served "family style".
- d. Smaller group activities are planned throughout the day.
- e. Carpet squares, yarn, masking tape, or other materials are used to create space for children during gathering times.

### 3. Classrooms

- a. Toys, furniture, chairs, tables, and door handles are cleaned and disinfected throughout the day and at the end of the day.
- b. Soft toys that cannot be cleaned and disinfected have been removed.

- c. Teachers are reinforcing healthy habits including proper handwashing procedures, sanitizing sinks and toilet handles throughout the day.
- d. Air conditioners are set between 72-74 degrees.
- e. In October 2020, UV lights were installed in all HVAC units to provide cleaner air in the classrooms.

#### **4. Children's Bathrooms**

- a. Sinks, toilet seats, and handles are sanitized before and after each child's use.
- b. Children are being taught to use a tissue when using a toilet handle to flush the toilet.

#### **5. Playgrounds**

- a. Staggered Outdoor Classroom times are followed.
- b. Toys, bike handles, play structures, tables, and door handles are cleaned and disinfected daily and throughout the day.
- c. A water jug and individual cups are available. Drinking fountains are closed.

#### **6. Staff**

- a. The staff's temperature is taken with a no-touch temporal artery thermometer. Any adult with a temperature over 100.0 will not be able to attend until fever and symptom-free for 24 hours or more. \*\*
- b. Teachers wash their hands when entering a new space, staff lounge, classroom, the kitchen area, etc.
- c. In the Staff lounge, teachers adhere to the 6 feet social distancing guidance.
- d. In the Staff lounge, teachers disinfect their eating area after eating.
- e. At the Staff computer workstation, one teacher at a time and disinfected after use.
- f. Staff lounge and workspaces are disinfected daily and, as needed, throughout the day.
- g. Handwashing and use of hand sanitizers is being done regularly.
- h. Weather permitting, breaks will be taken outside.
- i. Face coverings are always required. Our staff may adjust their face covering for differing circumstances. Some circumstances may include, high levels of activity, teaching a lesson (reading books or singing), or when reassuring a child while maintaining social distancing.
- j. As the new school year begins, teachers will wear smocks when children need to be held and comforted due to separation anxiety. Smocks will be changed when a child's bodily fluid comes in contact with the smock.
